THE SARUJA FOUNDATION ANNUAL and FINANCIAL REPORTS FOR THE YEAR 2018



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Executive Committee Report

The members of The Saruja Foundation continues to focus on the core objectives of the foundation. 2018 was a challenging year, but the foundation has delivered success in many areas.

Financials

Total receipts from donations and annual contributions have declined by 58% from D178,600 in 2017 to D75,672 in 2018. This was a result of the decline in members and household contributions as well as fell in donations received. Similarly, the foundation's total expenses also decreased by 27% from D120,174 to D87,252. Therefore, the foundation's net asset has also fallen by 20%.

Details financial activities are provided later in this report.

Key Activities

- 1. **Borehole Management**: The Foundation continues to manage the water supply system in the village. In 2018, D5,000 was spent on the completion of the borehole security house whiles D18,000 was paid as salary. All the taps are in good working conditions.
- 2. **Arabic School Project**: On 8th April 2018, the Foundation sub-committee in the village mobilized the youth in the community to dig the foundation for the start of the Arabic school building project. This was followed by the payment of a qualified mason for the masonry work by the foundation. The community of Saruja initiated the Arabic school project, and it is sponsored by Mr Ansumana Camara with some financial support from the Foundation. The building project is in progress at the moment after the first part was fallen by wind storm during the rainy season.
 - The foundation spent D58,850 towards the Arabic school building, of which D27,802 was funded through donations. The community also contributed free labour towards block moulding and the construction process.
- 3. Land Registration (Transfer Documents): After acquiring the land/plots for development purposes, the Executive and sub-committee also worked together in tandem to ensure proper documentation of the proposed sites for the Arabic school, market and the Health Post (Land Transfer Documents). This was done through the Alkalo with the support of the families that gave their lands to the foundation.

The Future

Although the foundation faces challenges to obtain external funding, our focus remains the same. In 2019 and beyond, we aim to build more partnership with government and NGOs. We shall still focus on the following key goals.

- Market (Construction)
- Arabic School (Building in progress)
- Health Center/Clinic
- Agribusiness
- Capacity building for Youths and Women

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Notes 1: Donations

The donation represents voluntary gift by individuals and entities toward the foundation's activities.

Notes 2: Annual Contributions

As per the constitution of the foundation, all members are to pay a specified amount as contribution annually. 2018 registered a decline in contribution from both the diaspora and households.

Notes 3: Water Supply Collections

The foundation manages the affairs of the water borehole in the village. Therefore, all the contributions by the households are collected and managed by the foundation. Out of the amount collected, D18,000 was to the security officer at the borehole in 2018 compared to D6,000 (four months) in 2017.

Notes 4: Major Expenses

In 2017, the foundation spent D53,874 on the road rehabilitation & cleaning exercises in the community. The donations largely funded these activities.

However, in 2018, D58,850 was spent on the Arabic school construction project. Out of the amount spent, D35,000 came from the foundation's funds while the D23,850 came from the donations towards the school. The total expenses of D58,850 exclude the amount donated in kind (cement) by an individual supporting the project.







About The Saruja Foundation

The Saruja Foundation (TSF) operates to address the development issues affecting the community of Saruja, and the need to foster a strong sense of unity among the community and stakeholders of Saruja.

The idea was conceived in 2015 and TSF was registered as a Non-profit, charitable, non-political, non-religious organisation on the 07 Aug 2017 to respond to the needs of the village in areas such as:
